

SOUTH TO TILLAMOOK

Oswald West State Park: Hiking Trails, primitive camping, beach access, picnic area.

Manzanita: This secluded town nestled on the beachfront has lodging and dining facilities for visitors.

Nehalem: Highway 101 runs through the middle of this community which borders the Nehalem River.

Nehalem Bay Winery: Located on Highway 53. Open every day for wine tasting and sales.

Kayaking: Rent a kayak in Nehalem or Wheeler and enjoy the Nehalem River.

Garibaldi Museum: Open May 1-Oct 31. History of 18th century sailors' and Captain Robert Gray, founder of Columbia River.

Tillamook Cheese Factory: Self guided tour, deli, ice cream.

Tillamook Air Museum: Housed in the world's largest clear-span wood building. The museum has more than 30 World War II planes.

Three Cape Scenic Loop: Southwest of Tillamook encompassing Cape Meares, Cape Lookout, and Cape Kiwanda.

Cape Meares Lighthouse: Oregon's shortest lighthouse. Tours daily.

Octopus Tree: A candelabra-shaped Sitka Spruce believed to be an Indian burial tree.

HIKING TRAILS

SADDLE MOUNTAIN TRAIL: Three miles each way. Highest point—3,283 feet. Allow at least two hours hiking up and 1 1/2 hours hiking down.

ECOLA STATE PARK-INDIAN BEACH TRAIL: A nice two mile hike from the parking lot of Ecola State Park provides open views of the ocean.

ECOLA STATE PARK-TILLAMOOK HEAD TRAIL: Six miles each way beginning at either Indian Beach or Seaside. Highest point along the trail - 1,200 feet. Allow 3 hours one way.

OSWALD WEST STATE PARK-SHORT SANDS BEACH: This 1/2 hour hike begins about 10 miles south of Cannon Beach. Park in the east side parking lot. It takes hikers into a rain forest along a creek that finally empties into the ocean.

OSWALD WEST STATE PARK: CAPE FALCON TRAIL: 2 miles each way. High point-300 feet. Allow 1 to 1 1/2 hours each way.

ARCH CAPE-(CONNECTS TO CAPE FALCON TRAIL): On the north side of tunnel go east. At this point you enter Oswald West State Park and a 5 mile stretch to Cape Falcon treats the hiker to the lush coastal rain forest.

NEAH-KAH-NIE MOUNTAIN TRAIL: One mile each way. Highest point along the trail-1,631 feet. Allow 1 1/2 hours each way. Travel south to point 2.6 miles south of Oswald West parking area.



CANNON BEACH

Cannon Beach is nestled on the Pacific Ocean. It is a favored year-round destination spot, boasting a wide selection of activities from first-rate amenities such as theater, bookstores and restaurants to historical and geographical landmarks and state parks.

Ecola State Park: Hiking Trails and beach access, picnic area.

Hug Point State Park: Access to beach, a waterfall and visible remnants of the old coast highway.

Haystack Rock: Tidepools and bird sanctuary.

City Park: Picnic area, playground, tennis courts, skate park.

Coaster Theater: High quality live theater, concerts and art shows.

Art Galleries & Shopping: Dozens of small specialty stores, boutiques and Art Galleries.

Cannon Beach History Center: Exhibits that tell the history of Cannon Beach.

Surfing & Boogie Board: Rent surf packages from the local surf shops. Inquire about lessons.

SEASIDE

Seaside is Oregon's oldest family beach resort. The Miss Oregon Pageant is held in Seaside annually.

Boardwalk: 2-mile boardwalk that was built in the 1920's. Runs parallel with the beach.

City Park: Indoor swimming pool, skate park, picnic area, restrooms.

Lewis & Clark's Saltworks: Site where the expedition set up a camp and boiled sea water.

Seaside Museum: Collections portraying the town's history in the making.

Seaside Aquarium: Discovery Center with hands-on open tank and seal-feeding tank.

Bumper cars, Miniature Golf, Tilt-a-Whirl: Generations of family fun.

Downtown: Features dozens of stores offering souvenirs, collectibles, fine apparel, candy and great gifts.

Seaside Factory Outlet Stores: Offers 30 manufacturer operated stores.

Surfing & Boogie Board: Rent surf packages from the local surf shops. Inquire about lessons.

ASTORIA, WARRENTON

The oldest American settlement west of the Rockies, Astoria offers more points of historical interest than any other city of the Oregon Coast.

Columbia River Maritime Museum: Oregon's official maritime museum. Board the Columbia, Lightship that once guided ships to safety at the mouth of the Columbia River.

Astoria Column: Built in 1926. Climb the 164 steps and get a spectacular view.

Fort Clatsop National Memorial: Winter encampment of the Lewis & Clark Expedition. Built during the winter of 1805-1806.

Fort Stevens State Park: US major defense for the mouth of Columbia River from the Civil War to World War II. See the South Jetty and the wreck of the Peter Iredale.

Victorian Flavel House: Built in 1885, is considered to be one of the best examples of Queen Anne architecture in the Northwest.

Uppertown Firefighters Museum: Extensive collection of firefighting equipment dating from 1879-1963.

Astoria Riverwalk: Stroll the paved path for a close-up view of the waterfront or ride the Astoria Riverfront Trolley.

Astoria Aquatic Center: Swimming Pool.

Tapiola City Park: Skatepark, playground, picnic area.
